





2 of my 24 had a memorial mentioning Civil War Service but no inscription on headstone



Wade told his children and grandchildren of the time in 1860 when he joined a group of Rangers, under the command of the famous Sul Ross, riding against the Comanches. On this trip Cynthia Ann Parker was taken back from the Indians. Wade said he stood guard over her at one time.

He served the Confederate States of America during the Civil War, working as a courier, stationed at Galveston Island, Texas, again serving Sul Ross. He married Rebecca just after the Civil War. She was the daughter of Andrew B. and Mary Ann (Rutledge) Howell, who had been born in North Carolina, migrated through Tennessee (where Rebecca was born), and on to Texas in the 1850's.







How to Find Confederate Pensions

- Look in state of residence, not service
- Trace them in census records (1870, 1880, etc.)
- Each state varies
 - Remarried widows not eligible
 - Unmarried or widowed daughters of veterans eligible in Virginia

CONFEDERATE ALABAMA TROOPS

14th Regiment, Alabama Infantry

OVERVIEW: 14th Infantry Regiment was organized at Auburn, Alabama, in July, 1861, with men from Montgomery and Auburn, and the counties of Chambers, Jackson, Randolph, and Tallapoosa. It remained in camp at Huntsville until October, them moved to Fredericksburg, Virginia. Later it was sent to Richmond to rest after suffering from camp diseases. Many suffered from measles: The 14th was assigned to General Pryor's, Wilcox's, Perrin's, Sanders', and W.H. Forms's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. It participated in many battles from Williamsburg to Cold Harbor, took an active part in the Petersburg siege south of the James River, then saw action in the Appomattox Campaign. In April, 1862, it contained 700 effectives, and reported 335 casualties during the Seven Days' Battles and 47 at Second Manassas. It tost 151 at Chancellorsville, and of the 316 engaged at Gettysburg, fifteen percent were disabled. The regiment surrendered with 11 officers and 180 men. Its field officers were Colonels T.J. Judge, Lucius Pinckard, and Alfred C. Wood; Lieutenant Colonels D.W. Baine and James A. Broome; and Majors M.P. Ferrell, Robert A. McCord, Owen K. McLemore, and George W. Taylor.


During Longstreet's attack on July 2nd Wilcox's Brigade successfully advanced to Plum Run before being stopped by the sacrificial charge of the First Minnesora Infantry. Confederate troops on his left flank failed to advance, and Wilcox puled back. His success may have been a factor in deciding Lee to Bunch Pickett's Charge across the same ground the next day.

Wilcox's Brigade was to have supported that attack as well, but poor communications and visibility caused it and Perry's Florida Brigade to move forward too late and in the wrong direction to help Pickett.




HISTORY OF THE 14TH ALABAMA REGIT.

On the 7th of August, 1861, this Regiment was mustered into service, by Major Calhoun, C. S. A. For some reason unknown to the author. the Regiment did not more immediately to the seat of war. They remained in camp at Abburn, Alabama, and were partially initiated into the hardships of a sobiler's life. On the 6th of October, 1881, they left for Huntsville, Alabama, at which place they arrived Oct. 8th. They remained at Huntaville until November 4th. The Regiment was ordered to report at Richmond, Va. This move was very injurious to the health of the men composing the Regiment, a majority of whom were just recovering from measles. They arrived at Richmond Nov 7th, and camped on the Old Fair ground, west of the city. Here the Regiment first received pay from the Government. On the 14th of November, the Regiment was ordered to Evansport, Vs. They arrived there on the 17th. Here the men began to experience in truth the hardships of a soldier's life; having been raised in Alabama, and the other Cotton States, the exposure which necessarily attends a soldier's life, on the bleak shore of the Potomac, was more than many of them could stand. Hundreds were sick, a great many of whom died So fatal was their sickness, that by the 1st of January, 1862, a little over a month, not quite two hundred were reported for duty. Colonel Judge, then in command, asked to be moved; but his petition was unnoticed by the commanding Genera), T. Holmes. The Colonel then applied and got leave to visit Richmond; and by his own exertions and nifuence, had the Regiment ordered by the Secretary of War to Richmond. The Regiment arrived at Richmond, January 3d, 1863, and was quartered at the Barracks, west of the city, known as Camp-Winder. Every effort was made by the Commanders of the Regiment to restore the health of the men. Here it remained in garrison life entil the 27th of March, when the enemy were threatening Yorktown. from Fortress Monroe. The health of the Regiment was partially restored. We were ordered to Yorktown; we landed there on the evening of the 27th of March. The next morning we marched out some four miles west of the town, and camped near Winn's Mill. Nothing here disturbed the regular routine of camp duty, save an occasiona rumor that the Yankees were advancing. On the 5th day of April early in the morning, couriers were riding raphily in every direction, from whom we learned that it was supposed that the enemy were ad sancing in force on Dam No. 1, situated about three-lourths of a mile below our camp. The long roll was beaten, the Regiment formed and marched down to the dam above named; we were drawn up in line of battle, and marched forward to the water's edge, and here we remained four days and nights. It was while the Regiment was at this place, that four men, belonging to Company G, viz: — Allen, — Allen, and — Lindsey, were posted across the river to watch and give intimation of the advance of the enemy; but not being properly instructed, and by their negilence, they were captured The morning of the 9th of April, we were marched back to our old camp; the whole Regiment was put to work building breast-works to



Objective

Discover the actions of three brothers, sons of John D. Isenhour and Sarah Bailey, in the antebellum period and during the Civil War:

- Valentine Isenhour, born 1820 in North Carolina and died 23 Apr 1895 in Clyde, Callaban, Toyon
- Mosss William Isanhour, Confederate solder, born 1823 in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, died 16 February 1862 in Fort Thompson, United States, married to Amanda Martha McKiney 1 October 1846 in Montgomery, Arkansas.
- Josiah Edmond Isenhour, born 1825 in Missouri and died 13 December 1868 in New Orleans, Louisiana

Findings

Valentine Isenhour

Searching within Arkansas' and Texas' Confederate service records yielded no results for Valentine Isenhour. No record was found for him in Arkansas Union' records either.

To find if Valentine's death record revealed anything about serving in the military during the Civil. War, I searched for his death certificate and gravestone. Family records indicate that his death date is 23 April 1885, but no death certificate' or gravestone' were found. It is assumed that






