Objective

Step 1 of the research process



Objective or Research Question

- What question are you trying to solve?
- Different types of genealogy objectives
 - Identify a person (which Charles is which)
 - Prove a relationship (who are Charles' parents?)
 - Actions (what did Charles do during the Civil War?)
- Manageable project size
 - 10-20 hours
 - Repeat
 - No more never-ending and overwhelming projects





- Original: first record created of event - i.e. birth certificate, census
- **Derivative**: index, transcription, etc.
- Authored: Book, Ancestry public member tree












Information

- **Primary**: the informant was an eyewitness to the event
- **Secondary**: the informant was not at the event personally, but heard about it
- **Undetermined**: the informant is not known




Unknown Informant?

Informant undetermined? Consider who the informant could have been.

i.e. The informant for this 1880 census could be a parent because the full middle names are given for each child. This makes the information more likely to be reliable.



- Indirect: provides a clue that could be combined with other clues to form a conclusion

Note: The 1780 marriage date is an estimate based on how many children they had in 1790 and William's estimated birth year. If William was born in 1760, he would be 20 years old in 1780. If they had 1 child every two years beginning in 1781, that gives them 5 children by 1790, which they had on the census.

Land Conveyance in October 1826

Nicholas Welch to William Keaton, Pendleton District, South Carolina⁸
Transcription: here.

On 4 Oct 1826 Nicholas Welch of Habersham, Georgia released 37 ¾ acres of land to William Keaton of Pendleton, South Carolina near Gennoastee Creek, Pendleton, South Carolina. The land was originally granted to Nicholas Welch on 1 April 1811. Robert M. Linn and David Welch were subscribing witnesses and it was recorded 1 January 1827.

Evidence: Indirect - Nicholas Welch, could be a relative of George Welch, Lucinda's husband, is selling land to William Keeton. Could be a clue about a connection between the Welches and Keatons

Land Conveyance in December 1826

William Keaton to Alexander Moorehead, Pendleton District, South Carolina⁹
Transcription - here.

William Keaton of Pendleton District sold land that was previously granted to Nicholas Welch to Alexander Moorehead whose property borders the land on 23 December 1826. William Keaton made his mark on that day. Then on 11 January 1827, Catherine Keaton, wife of William Keaton, relinquishes her claim of dower to the land. This is often required when a significant real estate transaction is taking place. I don't think it means that she was a dower at the time, but by relinquishing her dower rights, if William died, she would not seek out the property as part of her inheritance.

Evidence: Indirect - evidence of William Keaton's marriage to "Catherine" - who is listed as his wife in the dower release; also evidence that he resided in Pendleton, South Carolina in 1826-1827, somewhat near the time that Lucinda's daughter, Margaret, was married there at "Pendleton Factory" in 1843.

Quick Facts

- Formation: 7 March 1788, Pendleton County, part of overarching Ninety-Six District, was created from Cherokee and Creek Indian Lands and included all of present day Anderson, Pickens, and Oconee Counties.
- District Changes:
 - Ninety-Six District was divided in 1791 and Washington District was created with subordinates Pendleton County and Greenville County.
 - Washington District was renamed Pendleton District in 1798, with subordinates Pendleton County and Greenville County.
 - In 1800 South Carolina abolished overarching administrative court districts and most of the counties became districts. Pendleton County became Pendleton District
- Abolished: 20 December 1826 Pendleton District was abolished and turned into Anderson District and Pickens District
- District/County Seat:
 - 1789-1791 Abbeville
 - 1791-1800 Pickensville
 - 1800-1826 Pendleton (town), named after US Judge Henry Pendleton

- Write a summary of the record in your report so you don't have to come back to it later

Write a Report

- Create a report outline from your log
- Use the outline to write the report
- Discuss findings
- Use reference notes (footnotes/endnotes)
- Draw conclusions from indirect evidence
- Analyze conflicting evidence
- Suggest future research

- Locate the entire biography of Reuben Keaton in *The Heritage of Walker County, Alabama, Vol. 64*
- Identify each of the heirs of William Keaton in the 1830 Federal Census
- Locate the original land grant that William Keaton obtained in Pendleton County at the South Carolina Archives
- Locate the bounty land warrant dated 1787 for 350 acres of land in Chester County, South Carolina for William Keaton.
- Search Revolutionary War service records for William Keaton and Col. Richard Taliferro in 1777 and 1778.
- Find DNA Matches who also descend from William Keaton

Diving Deeper into Hypotheses

- Part of research planning
- Key way to find the information that solves your brick wall
- When one iteration in a project is complete, make more hypotheses that lead to the next phase of research

How do you make a hypothesis?

You don't have to know what happened

Look at the clues and then write what they show



Hypothesis about Lucinda's Birthplace

Lucinda Keaton Welch's birthplace is listed as South Carolina on the 1850 census when she lived in Alabama. Her daughter was married in Pendleton District, South Carolina. This is a possible location for Lucinda's birthplace and/or her parents' residence before moving to Alabama



Hypothesis about Lucinda's Father

Lucinda would have been 5 years old on the 1810 census, probably living in her father's household in Pendleton District, South Carolina. Only 3 men with the surname Keaton resided in Pendleton. Only William Keaton had a tic mark for a daughter of the correct age to be Lucinda. William was probably the father of Lucinda.



Hypothesis about Lucinda's parents' marriage

Lucinda Keaton's birthplace was South Carolina - I hypothesize that her parents were married there: search for marriages with the surname "Keaton" in South Carolina.



Hypothesis about William Keaton's Death

William was in Pendleton County Census records from 1790-1820, but not 1830. William's heirs sold his Land in 1832. William Keaton died before 1830 and there was probably a division of land recorded in his probate proceedings.

Choose a DNA Test To Answer Your Research Question

DNA evidence is not available for every type of research objective.

DNA Test Type	Research Questions
Autosomal DNA (men and women can be tested)	Questions of kinship up to about 5-6 generations from the test taker (3rd/4th great-grandparents)
Y-DNA (only men can be tested)	Questions of kinship along the patrilineal line
Mitochondrial DNA (men and women can be tested)	Questions of kinship along the matrilineal line

Lucinda Welch parents

Hypothesis: William Keaton and Katy Gresham are the parents of Lucinda Keaton.


Other descendants of William Keaton and Katy Gresham may be in my mother's DNA match list. Between 15-32% of 5th cousins are expected to share DNA. The range of shared DNA for 5th cousins is about 0-75 cM



DNA Research Methodology

- Use pedigree triangulation to determine how matches connect
- •Chart the relationships in a diagram
- ·Using shared matches at Ancestry.com, cluster matches that all share DNA on the Welch/Keaton side

Relationship to Leslie Helon

When two people have a DNA match, it means they inherited DNA from one or more recent common ancestors. The length of DNA they have in common is estimated in centimorgans (cM). The higher the number, the closer the relationship.


















AncestryDNA® ThruLines™

- Your tree must be either public or "private but searchable"



- Lucinda's descendant, Diana, is a DNA match to Mark, a descendant of William Keaton's son Archibald Keaton. They share 23 cM of DNA, consistent with the amount of shared DNA for a 5th cousin.
- Lucinda's descendant, Diana, is a DNA match to Rhoda, a descendant of William Keaton's son William Keaton Jr. They share 7 cM of DNA, consistent with the amount of shared DNA for a 5th cousin.


