# Is Elijah Dillard the Brother of Cynthia (Dillard) Royston?

# **DNA Research Report**

# Objective

This research phase aims to test the hypothesized biological sibling connection between Elijah Dillard and Cynthia (Dillard) Royston. Elijah Dillard was born between 1813-1818 in Georgia and died on 6 September 1886 in Coffee County, Alabama. Cynthia was born between 1815-1818 in Georgia and died in 1882 in Collin County, Texas. Cynthia married Thomas Beverly Royston about 1833 in Georgia or Alabama.

## Limitations

- The project was limited to 25 hours for research and writing.
- The documentary research was limited to records available online.
- Y-DNA will not apply for this project as Cynthia (Dillard) Royston does not carry the male-only Y chromosome.
- mtDNA will not apply for this project, as the tester, Victor Parker, did not inherit mitochondrial DNA from Cynthia (Dillard) Royston.
- atDNA analysis was limited to the DNA of Victor Parker, Cynthia's great-grandson.

# **Results Summary**

• Performed clustering with the Leeds method and discovered pedigree collapse for both the paternal and maternal lines of the tester, Victor Parker.

- Analyzed a Gephi network graph for only the Royston/Dillard lines and discovered a cluster independent of the pedigree collapse that had Elijah Dillard, 1816-1886 as the most recent common ancestor (MRCA). Hypothesized this could be a brother for Cynthia (Dillard) Royston.
- Diagrammed the connections between Victor Parker and descendants of Elijah Dillard, found that the relationships were viable based on the shared DNA probabilities.
- Summarized the known facts for Elijah Dillard in a table: land patents, marriage, census, military, and death.
- Noted the grouping of the locations for Elijah's records of Macon, Pike, Barbour, and Dale counties in Alabama all located in southeast Alabama.
- Searched Alabama probate records and found a possible connection in Edmond Dillard of Pike County, Alabama. Reasoned that Elijah may have settled in Pike County in the 1850s because of this connection.
- Researched Macon County, Alabama, land records and discovered three deeds for Elijah
  Dillard purchasing or selling land. Found no mention of family relationships but did find
  additional information for Elijah's timeline.
- Discovered mention of the George W. Dillard family in the land, probate, and court records for Macon County, Alabama. Reasoned there could be some kinship to this Dillard family. Previous research had ruled out George W. Dillard as the father of Cynthia Dillard, but he could be an uncle or cousin.
- Researched Pike County, Alabama, history and found information on the origins of the early settlers as Georgia, fitting with the census records naming Georgia as Elijah's birthplace.
- Located the death register listing Elijah Dillard's death. No parents were listed, but the record did provide evidence for the death date, place, and burial.
- Found a DNA match to Victor Parker descending from a different son of Elijah Dillard James Monroe Dillard. Reasoned that adding an independent line from Elijah strengthens the argument that Elijah Dillard is the MRCA of the Dillard cluster of interest and that he is a probable brother to Cynthia.
- Explored the possibility of a Florida connection to Cynthia's family through James Monroe Dillard.

# **Background Information**

# Genealogical Background Information

Who was the father of Cynthia (Dillard) Royston? Previous research explored the possibility that George W. Dillard, born about 1781 in Virginia, and died 1854 in Lee County, Alabama, was Cynthia's father. Indirect evidence supported this hypothesis: the proximity of residences in Alabama, the 1820 and 1830 census records showing a female of Cynthia's age in the George W. Dillard household, and naming patterns between the two families.

This hypothesis was proved wrong with the discovery of a family bible listing marriages for the children of George W. Dillard—none of whom were Cynthia born about 1815.<sup>2</sup> Instead, the Dillard female born in 1815 was Mariah L. Dillard, married to James Kivlin.<sup>3</sup>

Exploring other Dillard candidates for the father of Cynthia (Dillard) Royston eliminated the following men listed on the 1820 census of Georgia: Arthur, John, and Thomas Dillard (Jones County), Edmund and Nathan Dillard (Washington County), Owen and Samson Dillard (Emanuel County), Phillip Dillard (Burke County), and Theophilus Dillard (Jefferson County).<sup>4</sup>

Although not a candidate for Cynthia's father, Susan Dillard, who headed a household in 1830 in Muscogee County, Georgia, could be a connection. The female aged 10-14 in her

household could have been Cynthia, who married Thomas B. Royston about 1833.<sup>5</sup> Additional research did not reveal any further information on Susan Dillard, either a possible husband for her or members of her 1830 household.<sup>6</sup>

With George W. Dillard also residing in Muscogee County, Georgia, in 1830, the question is raised, was Susan Dillard a possible sister-in-law or other relation? Was Cynthia (Dillard) Royston related to George or Susan or both?

## **DNA Background Information**

DNA testing has become a new form of genealogical evidence for difficult genealogical questions. With the documentary research not revealing the father of Cynthia, DNA opens another avenue for research. This project used the autosomal DNA test results for Victor Parker, Cynthia's great-grandson. Autosomal DNA is randomly passed down to descendants regardless of male or female inheritance inherent in Y-DNA and mitochondrial DNA testing. Victor inherited about 12.5% of his DNA from Cynthia and up to 6.25% from each of her parents. Victor has over 63,000 DNA matches on AncestryDNA, and isolating DNA matches who also descend from Cynthia's Dillard line could discover family connections for further research.

Mitochondrial DNA testing could be used in the future if the research discovers a possible mother for Cynthia during the clustering and analysis of autosomal DNA matches. Y-DNA is not yet applicable since the Y chromosome is only passed from male to male, and Cynthia would not have received a Y chromosome from her Dillard father. Any of Cynthia's brothers, however, would have received a Y chromosome. If research identifies a viable candidate for her brother, his male descendants could participate in Y-DNA testing.

#### Leeds Method

Proving genetic relationships through DNA involves identifying the most recent common ancestor (MRCA) between two matches. Each person would have received a segment of DNA from the MRCA. When working with thousands of DNA matches, techniques that can cluster these matches for analysis facilitate the research. One technique called the Leeds method

provides a broad look at Victor's DNA. <sup>7</sup> Sorting the DNA matches into colored groups based on shared ancestors can show four great-grandparent lines. If those lines do not intersect, four distinct colors will emerge, each color representing one of the great-grandparent sets and DNA matches coming through those lines. However, if there was intermarriage on any line, DNA matches could share more than one common ancestor with the tester.




Figure 1. Leeds Chart for Victor Parker

Because Victor's ancestry is out of the southern United States, where intermarriage between families was common in the 1800s, this initial clustering revealed pedigree collapse on both the maternal and paternal lines (see figure 1).<sup>8</sup> Viewing user-submitted family trees discovered two main groups depicted on the spreadsheet: the maternal Brown/Heal matches (blue, green, purple, bright green) and the paternal Parker/Royston matches (yellow, red, orange, pink, bright blue, pink, and dark red).

Because DNA matches could share more than one common ancestral couple, this could potentially skew the amount of DNA shared between Victor and his DNA matches. This will be considered throughout the DNA analysis.

# **Network Graphs**




Figure 2. Network Graph for Victor Parker's Ancestry DNA matches

Networks graphs provide another view of a person's DNA matches and reveal connections between clusters. "Nodes in a network graph represent your DNA matches and the lines connecting them indicate a shared match to each other. When a group of matches has many connections to each other, they form a cluster." A network graph created for the Ancestry DNA matches of Victor Parker confirmed the pedigree collapse suggested by the Leeds clustering showing the clusters overlapping closely with each other, especially in the center of the graph. (See figure 2).




Figure 3. Royston-Dillard Network Graph for Victor Parker's Ancestry DNA Matches

Separating out the Royston-Dillard clusters from Victor Parker's clusters on the Brown, Heal, and Parker lines resulted in a more focused network graph.<sup>11</sup> See figure 3.




Figure 4. Peach cluster MRCA = Elijah Royston, Aqua Cluster MRCA = Robert C. Royston (son of Cynthia), Blue Cluster MRCA = Richard A. Royston (son of Cynthia)

Analyzing the Royston-Dillard network graph discovered the peach cluster in the top right section of the graph. This cluster connects to the blue and aqua clusters which contain known descendants of Cynthia (Dillard) Royston through two of her sons, Richard A. and Robert C. Royston. (See figure 4.) Both Richard and Robert migrated to Texas in the 1870s and were not involved in the pedigree collapse that occurred with Victor's ancestor, Sarah Royston, who stayed in Alabama.<sup>12</sup>

Examining the trees of some of the matches in the peach cluster found the MRCA to be Elijah Dillard, born about 1814 in Georgia and died about 1886 in Alabama.<sup>13</sup> (See figure 4.).




Figure 5. Lines of Descent for Ancestry DNA Matches through Elijah Dillard.

The diagram in figure 5 illustrates the lines of descent from Elijah Dillard to the three DNA matches with trees. Each comes through Elijah's son, Josiah Dillard, and has the relationship of 3C1R, 3C2R, or 3C3R to Victor Parker.

The three matches share between 24 and 29 cM of DNA with Victor Parker, well within the proposed relationships of 3C1R, 3C2R, and 3C3R. <sup>14</sup> With the discovery of the DNA match cluster with Elijah Dillard as the common ancestor, the research could then move to discovering more about him in the records.

# Documentary Research for Elijah Dillard

Surveying online trees for Elijah Dillard discovered basic facts about his life - land ownership, Civil War service, marriage, residence, and death. Table 1 provides a timeline and reveals the many locations where Elijah had dealings in Alabama: Macon, Barbour, Russell, Dale, and Pike counties.

### Alabama Localities




Figure 6. Colton's 1856 State Map of Alabama<sup>15</sup>

Elijah Dillard's records revealed his presence in Macon, Barbour, Russell, Dale, and Pike counties. Figure 6 shows the proximity of these counties, located in the southeastern part of Alabama. The timeline shows that Elijah first resided in Macon in 1848, then Barbour in 1852. He lived in Dale by 1854, then married in Pike in 1855. He enlisted in the Civil War at Troy, Pike County, in 1863. After the Civil War, he lived in Barbour County again, then moved to Spring Hill, Pike County, where he remained the rest of his life.




Figure. 7 Tribal Land in Alabama 1830<sup>18</sup>

Elijah Dillard likely moved into Macon County after its formation from the Creek cession of 1832. <sup>16</sup> During the late 1820s and early 1830s, white settlers desired the rich lands of eastern Alabama—land that the Creek Tribe had inhabited for years. The Creeks were part of the Five Civilized tribes of the southeastern United States and treated repeatedly with the United States government in hopes of preserving a homeland for their people. Little by little, however, parcels of land were ceded, with the final cession taking place in 1832. The Treaty of Cusseta gave the Creeks land in the west in return for over five million acres in Alabama that would be surveyed and sold to settlers. Alabama created eight new counties from the land. <sup>17</sup> Figure 7 depicts the tribal lands for three of the Five Civilized tribes that lived in Alabama.




Figure 8. East Alabama Counties - Present-day and Original<sup>21</sup>

Eventually, the eight original counties were divided up into the present-day boundaries. When Elijah Dillard patented land in Macon County in 1848, it was part of the northeastern tip of the county that became Lee County in 1866. <sup>19</sup> See figure 8. Where did Cynthia (Dillard) Royston reside during this era? Cynthia lived in Chambers County from 1850 - 1870—Macon County's northwest neighbor in 1850. <sup>20</sup>

### Alabama Probate Records

Probate records could name Elijah in an estate file or will. Because the timeline revealed Elijah's dealings in several different Alabama counties, probate research began by searching broadly indexed collections of estate files on Ancestry and FamilySearch. The following individuals were found.

- L. R. Dillard, Pike County, 1856 22
  - Lafayette R. Dillard and Harriette Dillard, minor heirs of Edmund Dillard, late of said county - guardianship bond by Susan M. Kolb
- Benjamin F. Dillard Greene County, 1850<sup>23</sup>
  - Widow Sarah Dillard, James L. Tunstall, executor
  - o 68 pages the last page includes the will, naming only Sarah, his wife.
- Frances W. Dillard, Macon County, 1865<sup>24</sup>
  - Heirs: brother George C. Dillard, L Dillard, Alonzo Dillard, wife, Mary, and children

#### **Edmond Dillard**

Edmond Dillard, whose Pike County estate file named his minor heirs as Lafayette and Hariette Dillard could be an individual of interest because Elijah Dillard married Winny Grubbs in Pike County and resided there for most of the remainder of his life. Edmond lived in Pike County in 1840 but had no male of the appropriate age to be Elijah in his household.<sup>25</sup> Elijah was born about 1816 and would have been about 24 years old in 1840.

Edmond died before 1848, when his widow, Susan M. Dillard married James B. Kolb in Pike County, Alabama. <sup>26</sup> The 1850 census of Pike County shows Susan and James Kolb with the following household.<sup>27</sup>

- Susan Kolb 53 GA [widow of Edmond Dillard]
- Caroline Kolb 28 GA
- Rachel Kolb 17 AL
- Harriett Kolb 14 AL

Of note is the 14-year-old female named Harriett. This would be the Harriett of the probate record and Susan M Kolb, named as her guardian, was almost certainly her mother. The Edmond and Susan Dillard family of Pike County could continue to be researched for connections to Elijah and Cynthia Dillard.

#### Benjamin F. Dillard and Frances W. Dillard

The Alabama probate search also revealed a Benjamin F. Dillard of Greene County. He lived in the western part of Alabama, several counties away from Elijah's known residences in the south-eastern part of Alabama. He is not likely connected to Elijah.

Another individual in the Alabama probate index was Frances W. Dillard, the son of George W. Dillard and Martha Wells. Born in 1823 in Georgia, he died February 1865 in Columbus, Muscogee, Georgia, and had dealings both in Columbus and Macon County,

Alabama.<sup>28</sup> As mentioned previously, research has disproven George W. Dillard as the father of Cynthia Dillard, but could he have been an uncle or cousin? Did Elijah Dillard live in Macon County because of this Dillard family or was there no connection?

Additional research in the specific records of Macon County could discover any records beyond estate files.

## Macon County, Alabama, Land Records




Figure 9. Location of Elijah Dillard's Land Patent #9358

Land records can provide details for an individual's life and evidence of relationships. The land patent research had determined that Elijah Dillard was a resident of Macon County, Alabama, at least in 1848. Lee County was created from parts of Macon, Tallapoosa, Chambers, and Russell Counties in 1866.<sup>29</sup> Elijah's land lay in the part of Macon County that became Lee County. Figure 9 shows the location of one of the land plots he patented in 1848.<sup>30</sup>

Did Elijah sell this land in Macon County? Did he purchase additional land? The deed index for the county found several references to Dillards, most for sons of George W. Dillard—George C., Frances W., and L.W. Dillard, but also three deeds for E. Dillard dated 1850, 1853, and 1854 that could refer to Elijah.<sup>31</sup> Viewing the deeds found that on 19 February 1850, Albert Greenway, of Macon County, paid off his debts to Elijah Dillard, also of Macon County, by deeding him an 80-acre land plot located in the SW 1/4 of SE 1/4 and the SE 1/4 all of Section 27 in Township 18 and Range 25. This land was located in the same section, township, and range as the land Elijah patented in 1848.

In 1853 and 1854 Elijah sold both the 120 acres from the land patent and the 80 acres from the Albert Greenway deed of 1850.

The 1854 deed states Elijah's residence as Dale County, Alabama. In 1854, Elijah received a land patent in that county for 80 acres as an assignee for John Mason. This was a military warrant and John was entitled to the land as payment for his military service as a private in the War of 1812. Elijah likely purchased the warrant from the sale of his Macon County land. Future research could focus on land records for Dale County to discover more about Elijah's actions in the early 1850s.

Although the land research discovered records for Elijah Dillard, none stated a kinship connection. Was Elijah connected to the George W. Dillard family of Macon County, or was it a coincidence that Elijah lived in the area at the same time as this Dillard group?

# Macon County, Alabama, Court Records

Another source of information for early settlers in a county is the collection of court records held by the county court. FamilySearch has digitized a number of loose court records, arranged by individual. Searching for Dillard revealed no records for Dillard in the "D" section for the time that Elijah resided in Macon County. The collection did yield an 1873 case regarding Frances W. Dillard's estate and a 1903 case for a Hannah Dillard.<sup>34</sup> Neither case shed light on Elijah Dillard's origins.

## Pike County, Alabama, Records

Elijah resided in Pike County, Alabama, almost exclusively after his marriage to Winnie Grubbs in 1855. A county history explained that most of the early settlers of the 1830s were Scotch Irish in origin from the Carolinas and that this was a poor part of Alabama with few slaves and mostly white settlers.<sup>35</sup> The Civil War didn't have as much effect on Pike County as other Alabama counties because of the fewer number of enslaved people.<sup>36</sup> The newspapers covering the area were *The Troy Messenger*— established in 1866— *The Enquirer* [1875], and *The Buzzing Bee.*<sup>37</sup> The coming of the railroad brought a huge increase in population. The area had 500 residents in 1870 and by 1880 that number had increased to 3,000.<sup>38</sup>

The neighborhood of Spring Hill— where Elijah resided— was heavily forested. The first settlers came from the Carolinas, then from Georgia, fitting with Elijah Dillard's birthplace of Georgia. Prominent names in the settlement were Grimes, Boutwells, Sanders, and many others.

The 1880 census enumerator found Elijah Dillard residing at Spring Hill in Pike County.<sup>39</sup> At age 64 he farmed and his wife, Winnie kept house. Elijah died six years later on 6 September 1886 at Spring Hill. The informant for the death register entry, C. M. Carlisle reported Elijah's age as 68 (born 1818), conflicting with the calculated birth year of 1816 from the 1880 census. C. M. Carlisle likely did not know Elijah's exact age nor did he know Elijah's parent's names.<sup>40</sup>

### **Documentary Research Summary**

The objective of this project was to find connections between Elijah Dillard and Cynthia (Dillard) Royston. To this point, the documentary research has shown no family or associates that connect the two hypothesized siblings. Cynthia first appears in the records with the 1850 census of Chambers County, Alabama. <sup>41</sup> She lived in Chambers County until her move to Collins County, Texas, between 1870 and 1880. <sup>42</sup> Chambers County is only separated from Pike County—where Elijah resided the majority of his life—by Macon County. The dearth of early records for both Elijah and Cynthia Dillard could point to several situations: a father's early death and lack of probate records for his estate, children left orphans being raised in different households, record loss due to burned counties, and more.

Continued work in the DNA may point to additional clues to Cynthia and Elijah's origins.

# DNA Research for Elijah Dillard

The Gephi Network Graph revealed a cluster of matches to the tester, Victor Parker, that appeared to have the MRCA of Elijah Dillard. Could additional evidence be added to this



hypothesis? When working with clustering DNA matches, finding those who descend from independent lines of the MRCA is beneficial. So far, the research had found matches descending only from Elijah's son, Josiah. Working with the shared matches of the peach cluster found an important new match descending from James Monroe Dillard.<sup>43</sup> Reviewing the attached tree revealed solid connections for each generational link.<sup>44</sup> Figure 10 shows the two independent lines descending from Elijah Dillard.

### A Florida Connection

The new DNA match and review of James Monroe Dillard's timeline discovered a Florida connection. Death certificates for three of Cynthia (Dillard) Royston's fourteen children provided the maiden name of "Dillard" with a birthplace of either Alabama or Florida. <sup>45</sup> The two instances naming Alabama are reasonable given Cynthia's time in Alabama from about 1834 to about 1875. The informants for those certificates were a son-in-law and a granddaughter, neither of which would have first-hand knowledge of Cynthia's birth.

The locality of Florida seems an outlier since no other record mentions any Florida connections. The informant for Mrs. Adeline Spear's death was Mariah (M.C.) Lovelady, sister to Adeline and another of Cynthia's daughters. Although Mariah also would not have first-hand knowledge of Cynthia's birthplace, she lived with her mother in both Alabama and Texas from her birth in 1859 until Cynthia's death in 1882. Perhaps Mariah kept in contact with Dillard family cousins and assumed a Florida birth based on this connection.

If Elijah Dillard was Cynthia's brother, his son, James Monroe Dillard, would have been a first cousin to Cynthia's children. James moved to Pensacola, Escambia County, Florida, by 1930 and could be the source of Mariah's listing of Florida on her sister, Adeline's death certificate.<sup>46</sup>




Figure 11. Map showing Pensacola, Florida, location for James M. Dillard, and Pike County, location for Elijah Dillard.<sup>47</sup>

Pensacola is located on the Florida panhandle and borders Alabama to the south, near the southeastern counties where Elijah Dillard resided in the 1800s. See figure 11 for the proximity of the locations. Cynthia lived in Chambers County, Alabama, just north of Barbour

and Bullock Counties shown on the map. Although it is doubtful Cynthia was born in Florida, the connection to Elijah Dillard's family could explain the naming of Florida as her birthplace by her daughter, Mariah.

# Conclusion

With documentary research not providing clues to the origins of Cynthia (Dillard) Royston, DNA analysis discovered a possible brother candidate in Elijah Dillard. Victor Parker, a great-grandson of Cynthia's tested his DNA at Ancestry and shared DNA with more than 63,000 people. Some of those matches would have also received a portion of DNA from Cynthia that could reveal clues to her parents. A Gephi network graph clustered Victor's matches into groups and analysis revealed a cluster that seemed to originate with Elijah Dillard. If he were Cynthia's brother, the shared DNA would come from Elijah and Cynthia's unknown parents.

Documentary research explored Macon County, Alabama, court, probate, and land records for Dillards. Elijah Dillard was the subject of three deeds and other Dillards mentioned in the records were sons of George W. Dillard. Although previous research discounted George W. Dillard as Cynthia's father, the Macon County research does suggest that Elijah and Cynthia Dillard could be connected somehow to the George W. Dillard family - perhaps he was an uncle or cousin.

Searching Pike County, Alabama, records resulted in the death register entry for Elijah Dillard. No parents were named, but the record did name a specific death date, place, and burial for Elijah.

Returning to exploring Victor Parker's DNA matches in the network graph's peach cluster found a new match descending from a different son of Elijah Dillard - James Monroe Dillard. This adds an independent line and further evidence that Elijah Dillard is the MRCA of the cluster and that he could be a brother to Cynthia (Dillard) Royston.

James Monroe Dillard lived in Escambia County, Florida, on the southern Alabama border in the 1930s. Perhaps he kept in touch with his probable first cousin, Mariah (Royston) Lovelady, and her reporting of Florida as Cynthia's birthplace stemmed from this connection.

Further research in both documentary records and DNA is needed to continue exploring the connection between Cynthia and Elijah Dillard.
